Nearly twice as many people rated EC & PH (left) as overlapping more than half than EC & RJ (right)


PH WAS SEEN TO HAVE A STRONGER

BACKGROUND

The mission of Woodland Park Zoo (WPZ) focuses on communicating and promoting environmental conservation. However, recent social protests, with increasing support for the Black Lives Matter movement, as well as the sweeping effects of the COVID-19 pandemic, make clear the need for embracing interconnections between environmental conservation, public health, and racial justice.

WPZ wants to know more about how the public perceives interconnections between these three topics, if at all. To inform future communication frameworks, WPZ is continuing their partnership with UW's Museology Specialization in Museum Evaluation Program to collaborate with graduate students in conducting a front-end evaluation for the year 2020-2021.


PURPOSE STATEMENT & EVALUATION QUESTIONS

The purpose of this study is:

To inform a reassessment of Woodland Park Zoo (WPZ)'s existing conservation communication frameworks by exploring how their low and high affinity audiences intrinsically connect **Environmental Conservation**

Public Health, and Racial Justice.

- How do audiences describe Environmental Conservation, Public Health and Racial Justice?
- a. What connections, if any, do audiences perceive between these three concepts?
 - **b.** How strong or weak are these perceived connections?
- How do these perceptions differ between high and low affinity audiences of WPZ?



METHODOLOGY



(EQ 1, 2b, & 3) 217 Participants

Developed to explore perceptions of EC, PH, and RJ both in relation to each other and separately. The survey was conducted using the online platform, Survey Monkey, (Appendix A), and participants were recruited through community boards and through the social media of WPZ.



MATCHED, NESTED INTERVIEW (EQ 1 & 2a) 13 Participants

From the survey, participants self-selected to participate in a matched, nested interview. This nested interview was semi-structured, and used survey responses as a prompt to talk more deeply about the dynamic relationships between EC, PH, and RJ (Appendix B).
